How to: HOST A SUCCESSFUL DEBATE



- *Advertise!
- *Post event teasers
- *Find a way to make your audience interested in the topic.



*Check your location has good acoustics, all speakers can be heard, and there's plenty of space for your audience to sit comfortably.



*Consider how long each speaker will talk. A speech of 3–5 minutes is a good length to make your arguments without losing audience interest.

*Appoint a timekeeper who will stick to the agreed times!




*Is there a way you can link your debate to something that's happening at school? What about fundraising? *Consider offering prizes for participation, the winning team, the most dynamic speaker, or for audience participation!

How to: **BE A GOLD MEDAL DEBATER!**

Plan Your Argument

- *Find out as much as you can about the topic
- *Use research or reputable sources to back up your arguments
- *With your teammates, plan your case—write down as many arguments and examples you can think of to support your overall argument
- *Consider what your opponents' arguments might be. How will you refute or counter their arguments?



Watch Your Language



*Use exciting and persuasive language to create your argument. Have you heard of rhetorical questions? Repetitive amplification? Similes and metaphor? You'll need these tools if you want your audience to hang on your every word!

Practise! Practise! Practise!

- *Practise your speech until you feel comfortable saying it without reading it word-for-word
- *Practise in front of a mirror to check how much eye contact you are making
- *Ask someone to record you speaking so you can check your body language, clarity and speed of speech.
